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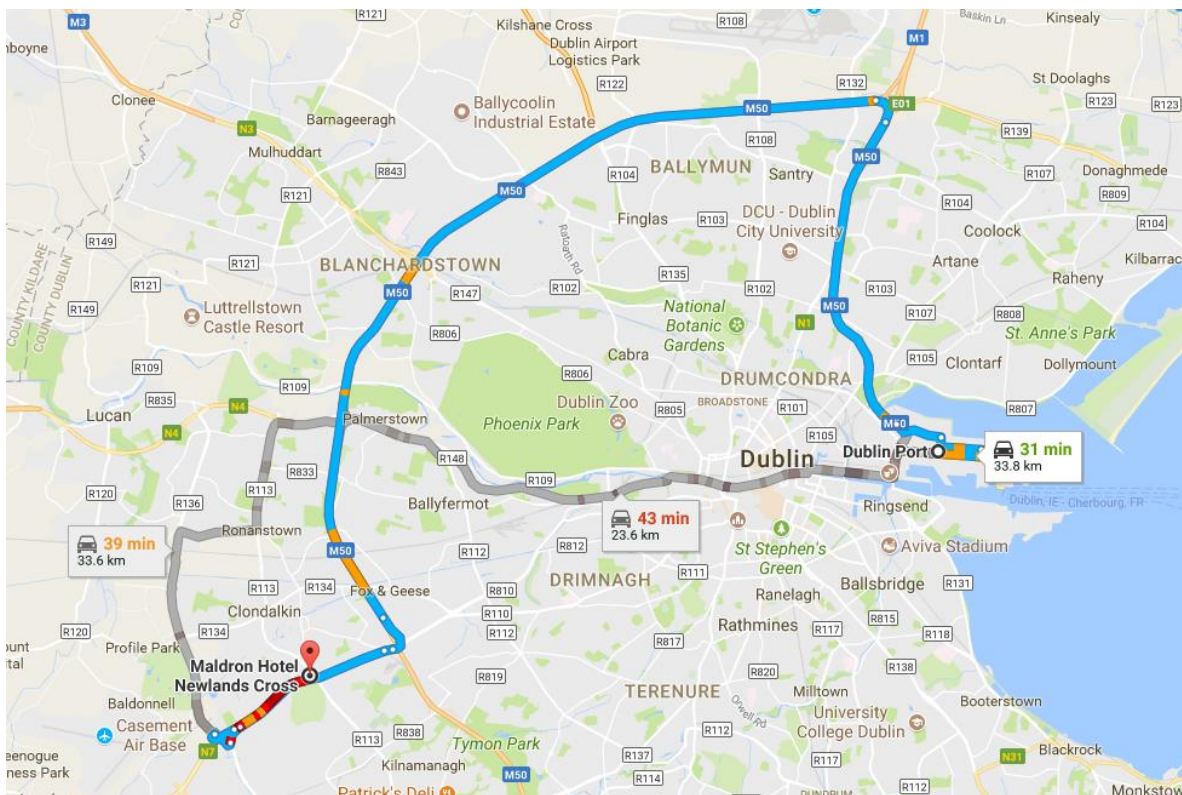
IRISH TOURISM

Day 1

Meet at Holyhead Port and board your ferry to Ireland. On arrival at Dublin Port commence your journey to the nearby Maldron Hotel Newlands Cross. Please don't forget to pay your M50 Toll before 8.00pm Monday 9th April. This can be done in one of four ways: got to www.eflow.ie and select "I want to pay a toll"; in person with cash or card at any [Payzone](#) retail outlet nationwide. Have the vehicle's licence plate number ready and tell the cashier how many journeys you'd like to pay for; download the M50 Quick Pay App on [Apple](#) and [Android](#) stores; call on LoCall 1890 50 10 50 from the Republic of Ireland, 0845 30 15 405 from the UK, or +353 1 4610122 from any other country. 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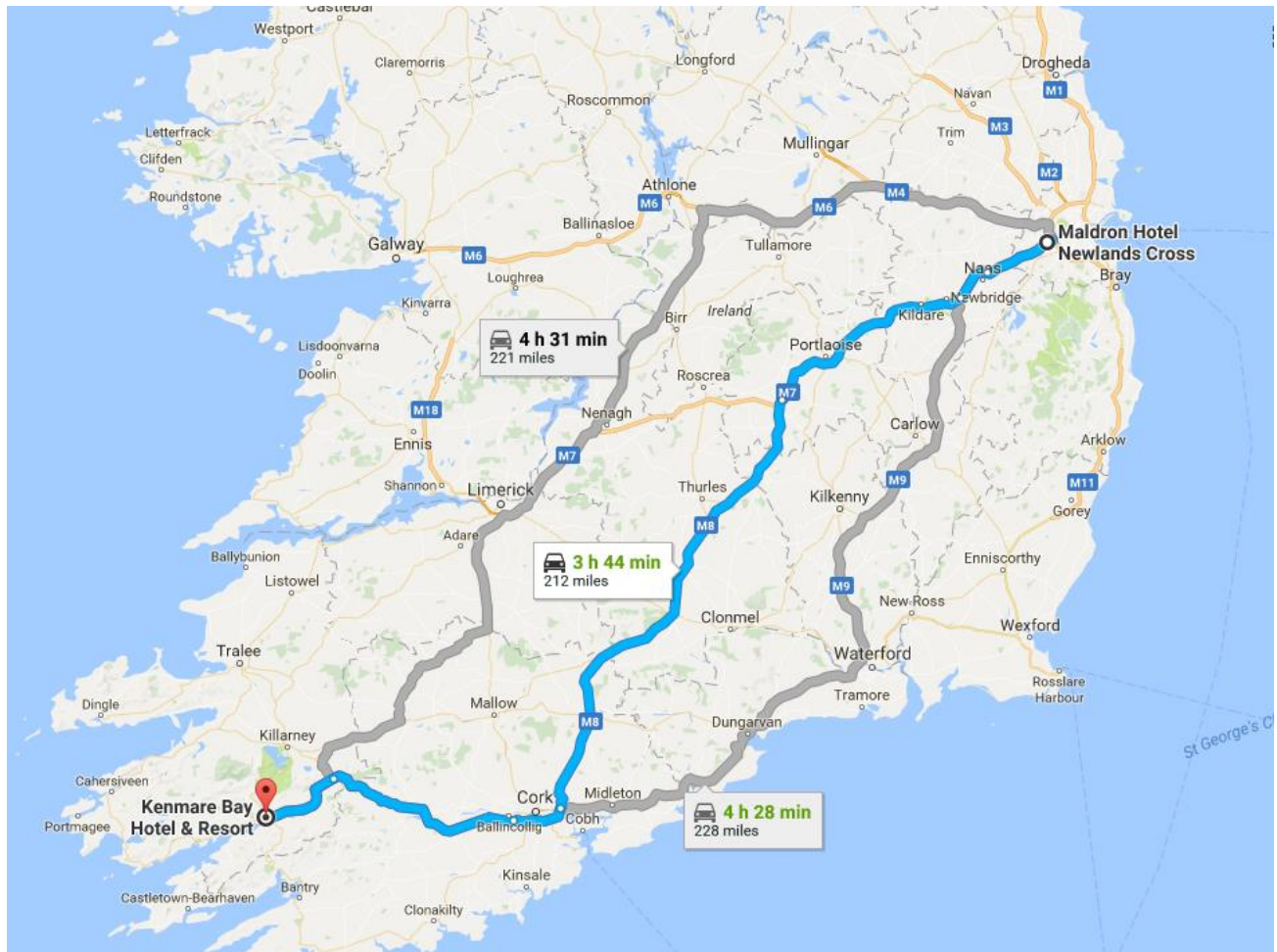
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Day 2

Today you start your journey to Kenmare, for which there are four possible routes as displayed below. The shortest route will take you via the M7 & M8 to Cork and then on to Kenmare. One alternative would be to travel the M7 & M9 via Waterford & Cork or the M4, M6 & M7 via Athlone & Limerick. The most direct route will take you down the M7 and via Limerick & Adare. 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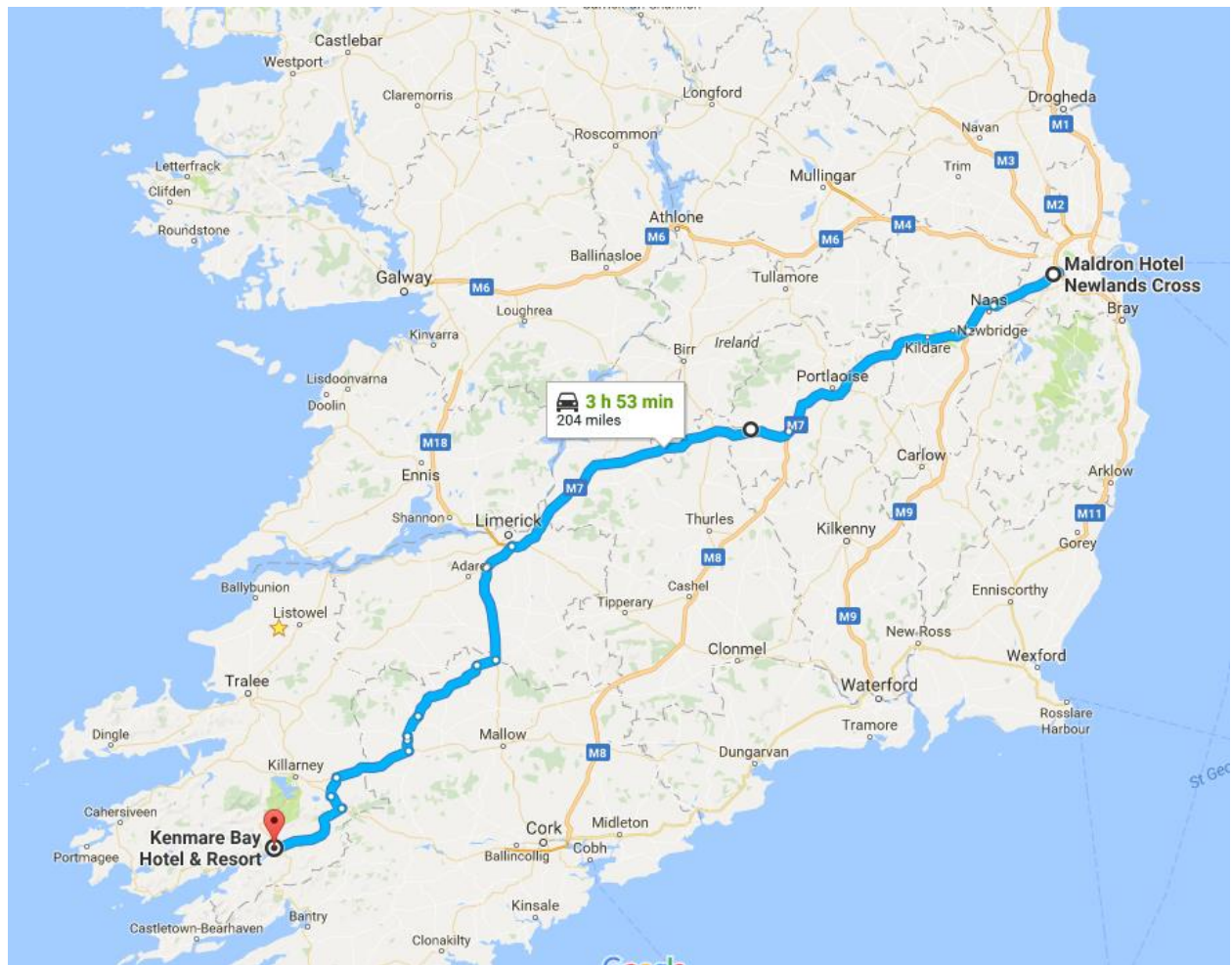
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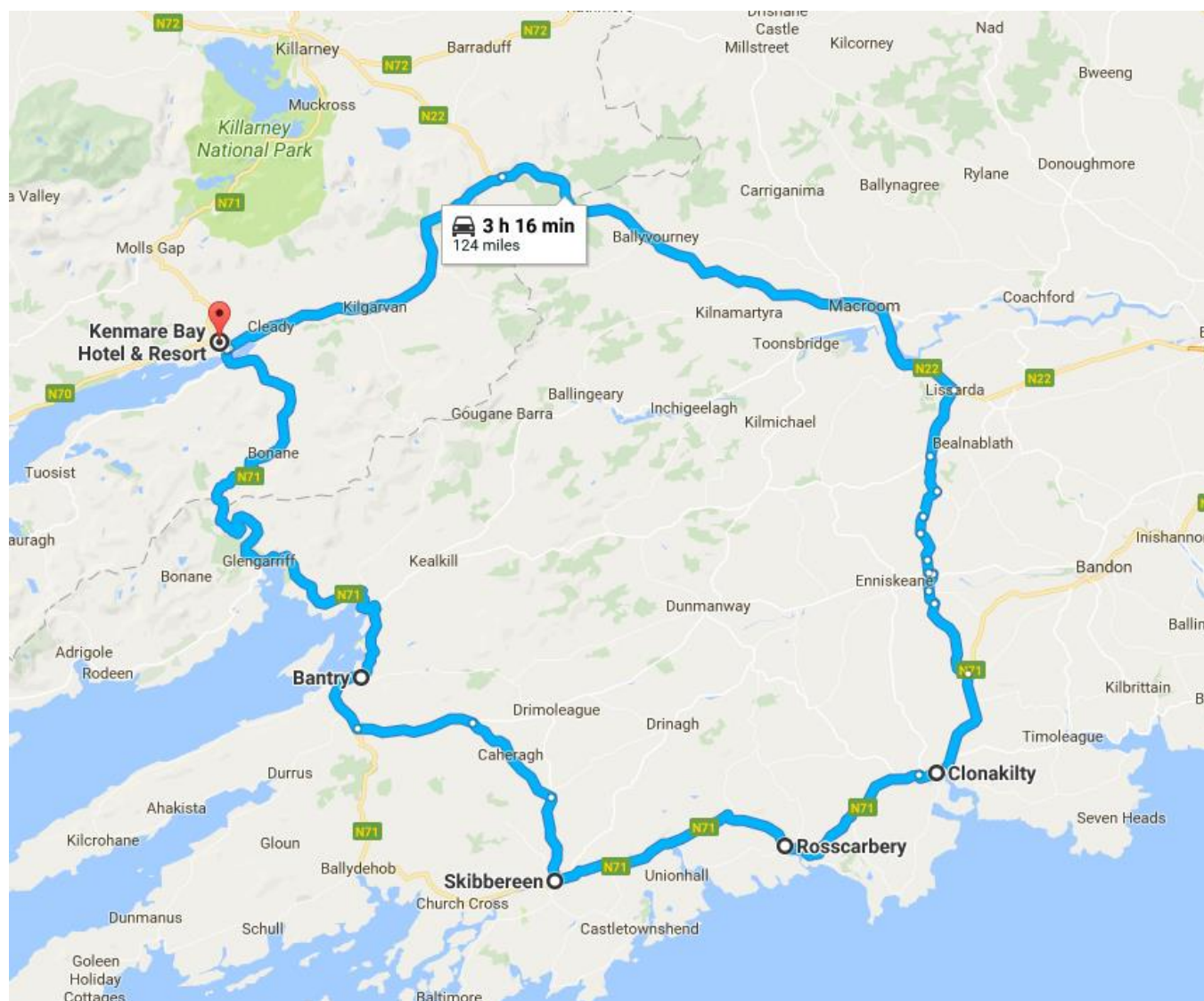
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Day 3 – Day 5

During your time in Kenmare there are several alternative day tours you can take, a selection of which is outlined below. Each evening will be spent at the Kenmare Bay Hotel on a DBB basis.

Bantry, Skibbereen & Clonakilty

This circle trip takes in some wonderful places where you can stop. In Glengarriff, take the ferry to Garnish Island, world renowned for its gardens; Bantry House – an 18th century mansion still owned by the White family; Skibbereen which was devastated by the 1840's famine which is detailed at the Heritage Centre; Clonakilty with its beautiful beaches; Macroom, a market town with a 17th century castle.



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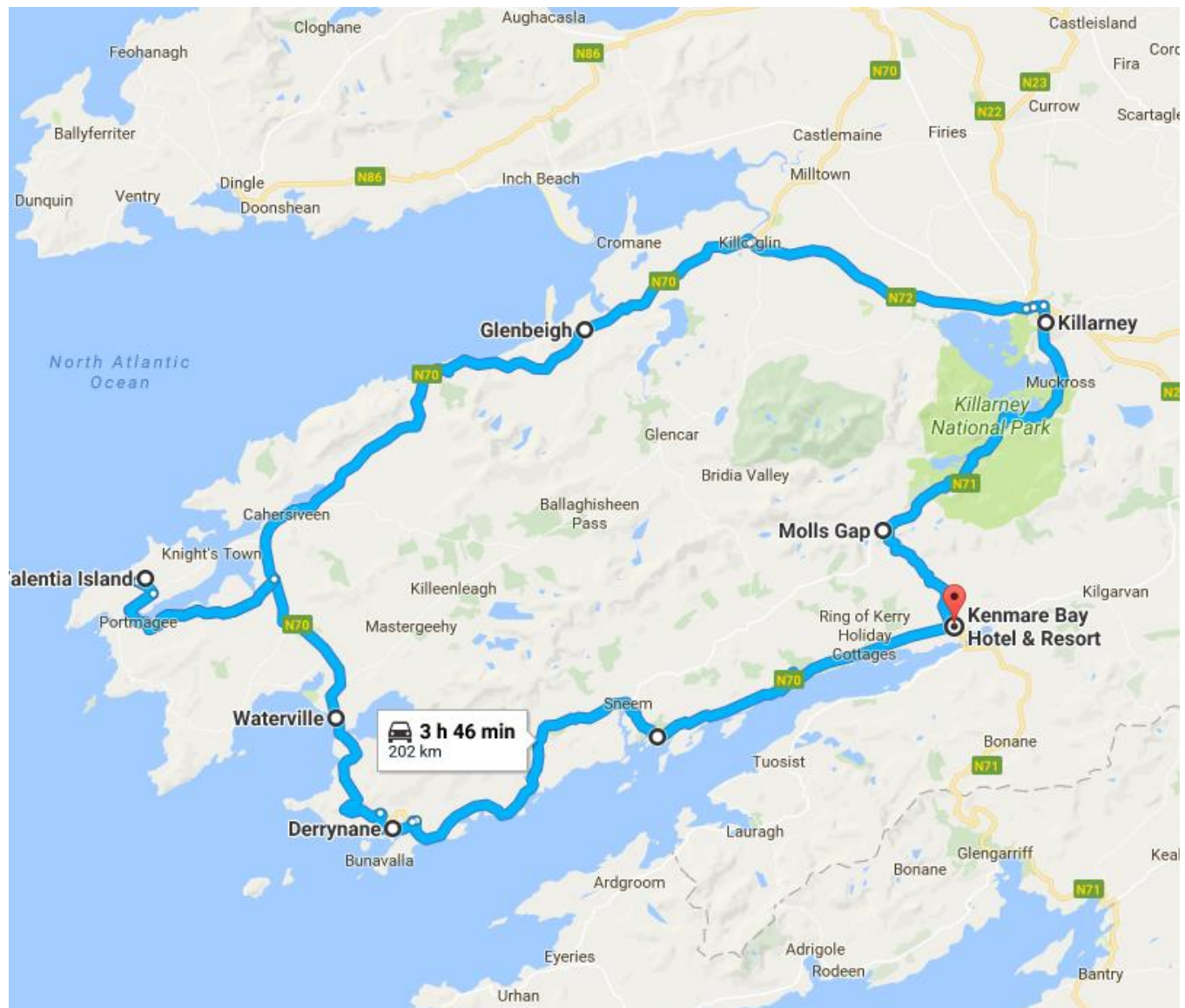
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Ring of Kerry

Kenmare is situated on the southernmost part of the Ring of Kerry, one of Ireland's most famous drives. From Kenmare travel to the colourful village of Sneem, Waterville (one of Charlie Chaplin's favourite spots), Valentia Island to view the Skellig Islands (featured in Star Wars), Glenbeigh, Kilorglin and of course Killarney. Note that coaches travel the Ring anti-clockwise so we suggest your direction is clockwise. Some of the sights you will see are Ladies View, Molls Gap, Staigue Fort, Derrynane House, Kells Bay House & Gardens, the Bog Village and the Gap of Dunloe to name a few.



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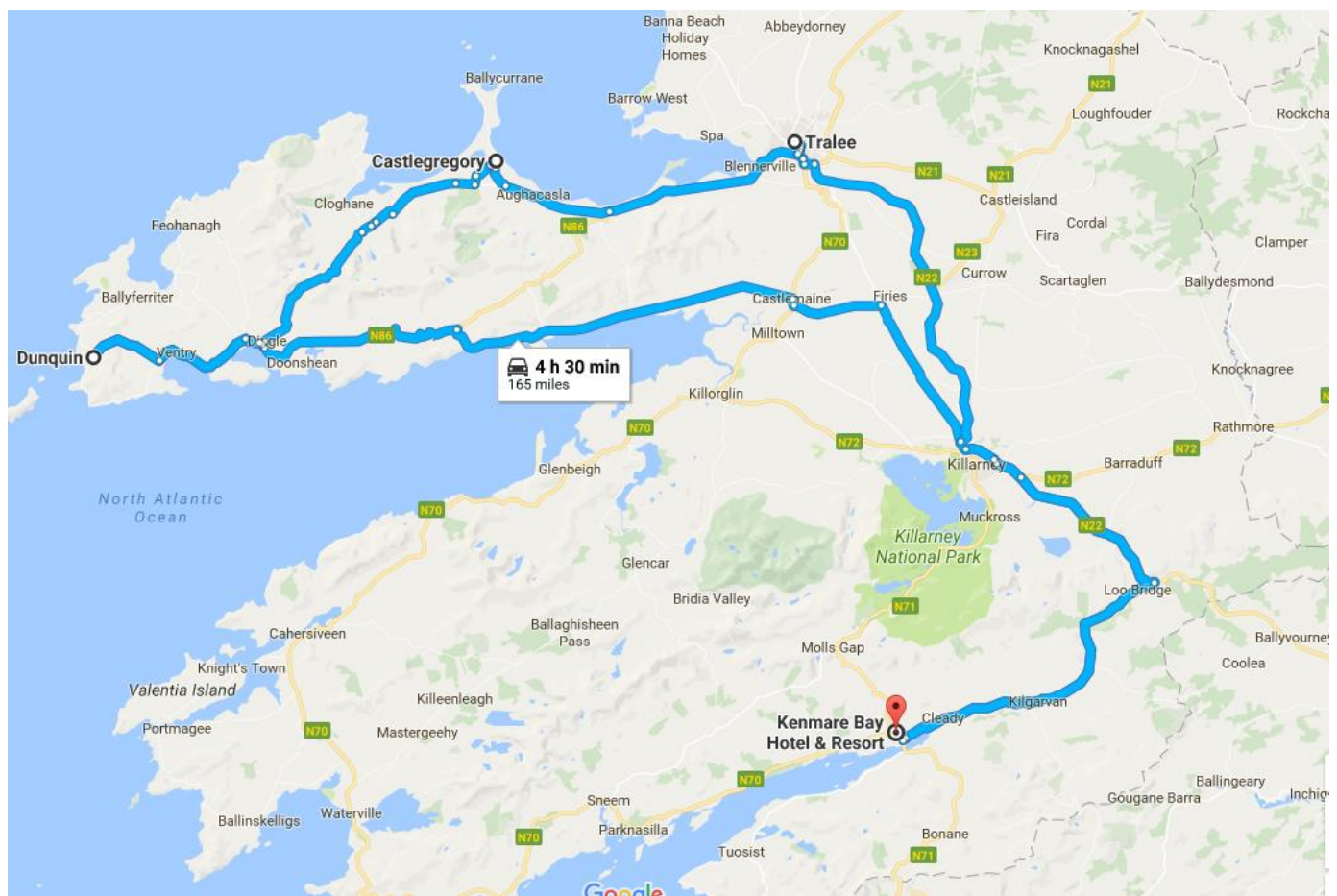
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Dingle Peninsula

Not as busy as the Iveragh Peninsula where the Ring of Kerry is found, the dingle peninsula is just as interesting and beautiful. The town of Dingle is a small fishing port where you will find plenty of pubs, cafes and restaurants to have lunch. Then to the west of the town the scenery is particularly rugged with views out to the formerly inhabited Blasket Islands. Visit the Blasket Center which celebrates the story of the Blasket Islanders, the unique literary achievements of the island writers and their native language, culture and tradition. Take a boat tour and see Fungi, its resident dolphin, visit many Neolithic forts and beehive huts and drive through Ireland's highest mountain pass – The Conor Pass.



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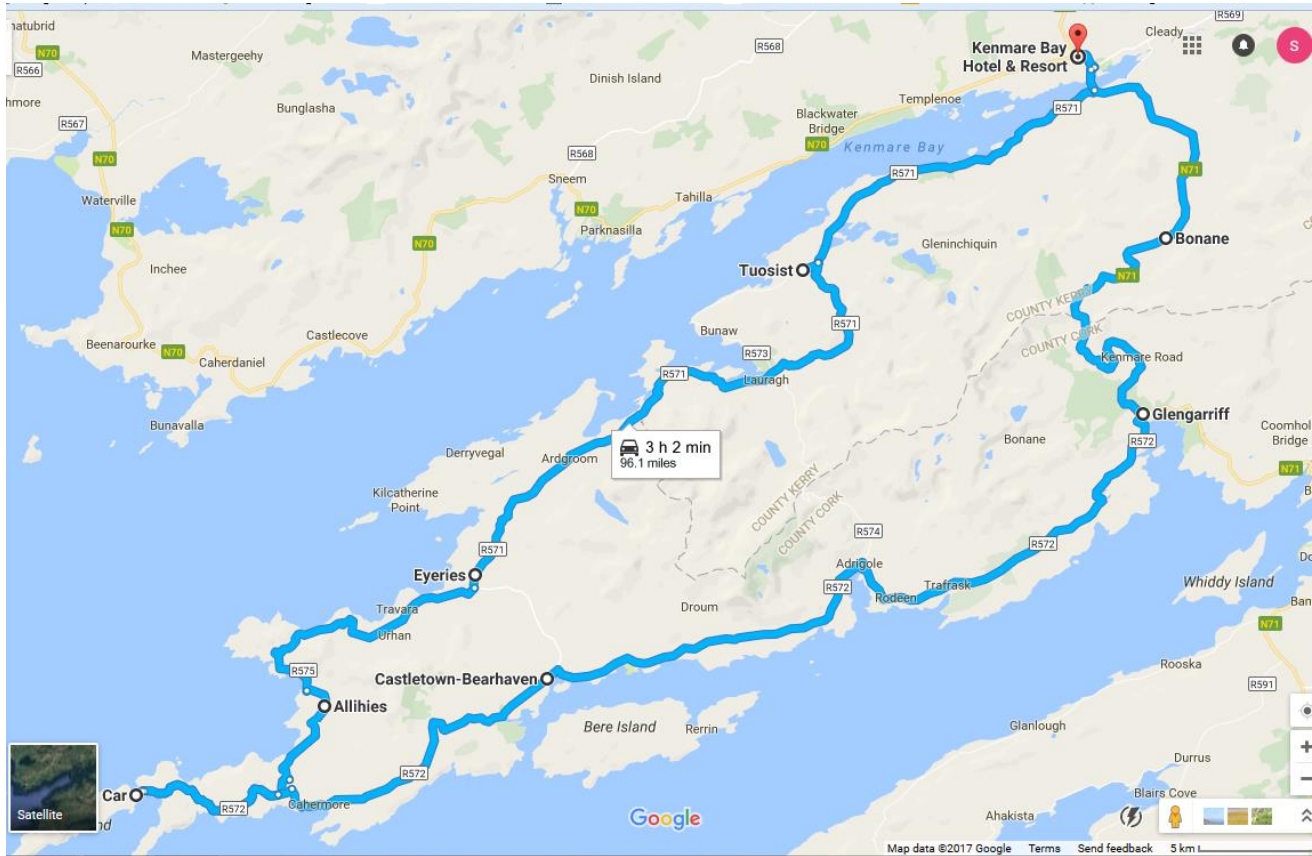
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Beara Peninsula

Located south of Kenmare, the Bera Peninsula has two mountain ranges running down its centre, the Caha Mountains and Slieve Miskish Mountains. On this route there are several interesting and beautiful sites to visit – Garnish Island, Gleninchaquin Park, Uragh Stone Circle, Bamboo Park, Derreen Gardens to name a few.



Non-stop driving time approximately 3 hours, 96 miles

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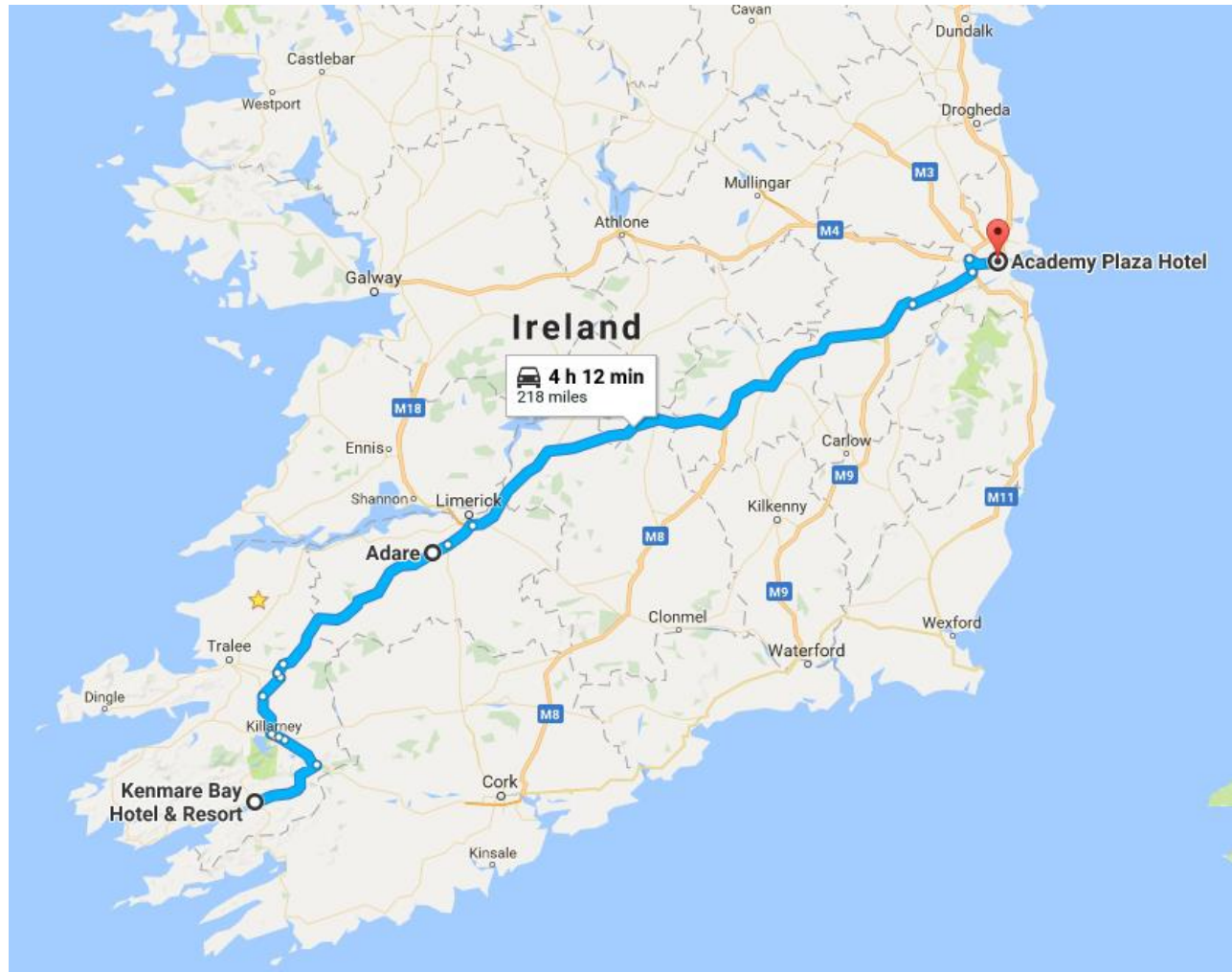
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Day 6

Check out of your hotel and start your journey back to Ireland's capital city. The most direct route would be via Adare Limerick & then M7. Alternatively you could take one of the routes suggested on Day 2 in reverse. There is a manned public car park just a 3 minute walk of the hotel. Overnight Academy Plaza Hotel, Dublin DBB



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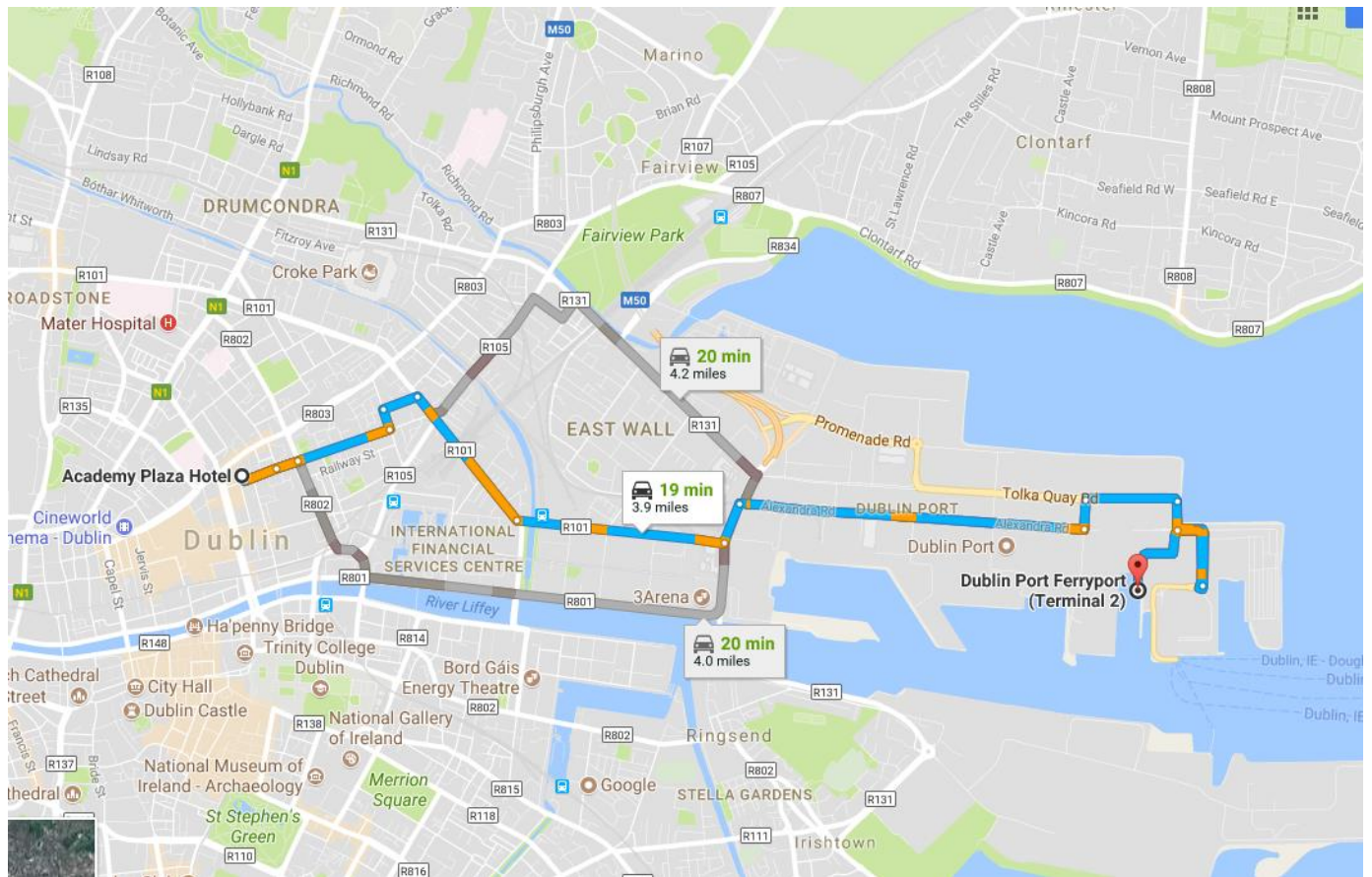
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Day 7
